## MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIR

This year has been one of incredible activity. We commenced operations as an Independent Natural Resource Management (NRM) Region. This entailed considerable reorganisation, and an increase in staff, to meet the Commonwealth's obligations. It also included the development of the Region's NRM Plan; Binjareb Boodja Landscapes 2025, achieved after much consultation and in an amazingly short time.

Our updated Strategic Directions has also guided delivery of projects ranging from our landscape scale Rivers to Ramsar to assisting appropriate horticultural development. Our goal of influencing decision makers has seen a strong involvement in the Strategic Assessment of Perth and Peel Directions31 planning, and in the Peel-Harvey Estuary Management Committee.

This Report provides a snapshot of the highlights, achievements and on-ground environmental outcomes that have been accomplished with our investment and project partners. As always, these success stories could not have been achieved in isolation. As well as our many partners we have incredibly committed and able staff helping people work together for a healthy environment.

- Together with our local Noongar community we designed and implemented a milestone 'caring for country' training program that resulted in 13 community members reaching national accreditation in chemical safety and handling
- We reviewed and updated the lower and mid Murray River Action Plans, comparing past and present foreshore conditions to identify priority areas for future restoration activities
- With the Hotham Williams community we developed a Draft NRM Plan that sets out the future of Landcare across the 573 000 hectare sub-catchment over the next 5 to 10 years
- We supported 10 landowners to co-invest in a range of biodiversity projects, including the creation of riparian corridors for cockatoo iconic species, via the first round of our community grants

We protected and enriched our Ramsar 482 site through weed mapping and control, infill planting to enhance previous revegetation projects and the installation and repair of physical barriers to restrict illegal access.

With our project partners, Department of Parks and Wildlife, Green Army, Lake Clifton-Herron Landcare Group, Lake Mealup Preservation Society and Growing Towards Wellness we:

- Mapped and controlled over 80 hectares of weeds at Lake Mealup, including Sydney Golden Wattle and Cotton Bush
- Removed 15 hectares of isolated Cotton Bush and Apple of Sodom in good bushland in Yalgorup National Park
- Removed over 2,000 tree guards for re use
- Monitored and watered 20 Ghanias transplanted in 2014
- Controlled illegal access to Lake McLarty, Kooljerrenup and Yalgorup National Park, including installation of gates, new fencing and repairs to existing fences
- Undertook follow up weed control along the Lake Clifton Buffer
- Completed infill planting at Lake Clifton with the Lake Clifton-Herron Landcare Group and Growing Towards Wellness
- Assisted the Lake Mealup Preservation Society to develop a website

We identified and implemented communication approaches to raise awareness of the Peel-Yalgorup System Ramsar 482 wetlands through education and participation with the community.

With our project partners, the City of Mandurah, Birdlife WA (Peel Branch) and David Rennie, we delivered the following key communication achievements in the final stage of this 3 year program:

- We formed an Expert Panel and we prepared WA's first 'Wetlands and People Plan'
- With award-winning photographer David Rennie, we raised awareness of environmental issues impacting our Ramsar system through the arts at the 'David Rennie and Friends' evening
- We prepared, published and distributed 2,500 migratory shorebird 'information and education cards'
- We introduced and co-ordinated the 'Pave the Way Clean Up Day' along the Coodanup foreshore to raise awareness of the habitat and food requirements of migratory shorebirds
- We supported the International Kids Teaching Kids Conference with Noongar storytelling linked to Country
- We produced interactive community engagement displays for our offices

- We worked closely with project partners, community and local Noongar groups to undertake cultural and community engagement activities to improve cultural values, wildlife corridors and ecological function of our landscape.
- With Birdlife WA, City of Mandurah, Department of Parks and Wildlife, Harvey River Restoration Taskforce, Landcare SJ and Shire of Murray we accomplished the following key achievements for Stages 3 and 4 of our 8 Stage Project:


