Jess Beckerling is the convener of the WA Forest Alliance and campaign director of Forests For Life. Jess has been involved in forest matters for 22 years and believes that with clever and courageous planning, forest conservation and timber production can harmoniously coexist and deliver multiple benefits.

Professor Giles Hardy is an undergraduate teacher, a postgraduate supervisor and research scientist at Murdoch University and co-ordinator of the State Centre of Excellence on Climate Change, Woodland and Forest Health.
