Tunbridge Gully Planting Underway



The Tunbridge Gully reed planting day was held with Boddington District High School students, the Friends of the Reserves – Boddington (Inc.), South32 and Newmont Boddington Gold at the end of October.

Over 7000 seedlings were planted on the day with the aim to restore native vegetation and increase biodiversity in the creekline which is currently being controlled for the invasive weed *Juncus* *acutus* (Spiny Rush). It was a very warm day and we thank everyone for their efforts.

We are also pleased to advise the Tunbridge Gully project will continue for an additional 2.5 years thanks to South32 funding.

We look forward to continuing to work with all of our amazing volunteers at future planting days.

Rabbit Virus Released

Thank you to all the landholders and Shire staff who have assisted us with the release of the RHDV-K1 virus to control feral rabbits. Over two weeks in November, the virus was released at 31 sites across the sub-catchment. The project involved prefeeding of virus free pellets for 3 days prior to the virus release. Landholders have been recording rabbit numbers during this time as well as after the release (to determine effectiveness) which will be included in a centralised national database. Areas in the Eastern States are showing great results since the 2017 release.

Interest in Grants Exceeds Expectations

Our officers have been busy getting around to visit landholders as part of the 2018 Community Environmental Grants. Where possible our officers made a visit to each landholder to help them plan their projects and assist with applications. Applications will now be assessed by our Steering Committees against project criteria and we plan to notify applicants of the results early December.

Project Objectives (as per Community Investment Agreement):

- a. The provision of the appropriate level of qualified Full Time Equivalent (FTE) individual (currently proposed to be 0.8 FTE shared across 2 staff), the leveraging and commitment of the financial resources (*Detailed in Schedule 3) that will enable the effective planning, management, delivery and administration of the Project and the following specific natural resources management objectives;
 - 1) To commission a study of Hotham River & Williams Rivers and tributaries that will inform the development of a River Action Plan (RAP) and an appropriate post graduate research project to address existing natural, conservation and cultural resource management knowledge base gaps inclusive of Aboriginal cultural perspectives;
 - 2) To deliver biosecurity projects, activities including building the capacity of local community groups and NBG neighbouring landholders through education programs. Scope and progress the establishment of a bio-security group in the upper catchment.
 - 3) To build community capacity for future land management including the delivery of priority species conservation workshops; accredited skill development training courses with a focus on NBG's neighbouring landholders and local Aboriginal community stakeholders; and the organisation and delivery of local community planting events that are focussed on priority catchment areas;
 - 4) To undertake a specified number of restoration projects relating to the Hotham and Williams Rivers and tributaries, informed by priorities identified in the RAP including invasive weed control; riparian vegetation and community planting days across the catchment;

- 5) To develop and deliver a landowner grants program that supports sustainable agricultural activities across the catchment and that is aligned with NBG's Social Investment Policy criteria related to Natural Resource Management & Protection including:
- 6) Protection and rehabilitation of local water catchments;
- 7) Restoration of forest reserves; and the
- 8) Enhancement of local and regional biodiversity protection.
- 9) To proactively identify, communicate and facilitate collaborative opportunities to leverage NBG technical, human and physical resource support including the involvement of employee's in volunteer planting, restoration and other land management opportunities for specific project activities; and
- 10) To effectively manage, monitor, administer and report on the activities and outcomes of the Project as more specifically detailed in Section 5.
- b. To the extent reasonably practicable and subject to receiving the requisite level of external project funding, the PHCC agrees to use its best endeavours to deliver the specific Project deliverables detailed in Schedule 3 by 1 December 2022.
- c. The PHCC agrees that those Aboriginal engagement elements of the Project, including the scoping and development of the cultural knowledge research project and additional training opportunities, will be developed in consultation with local Aboriginal stakeholders (including Traditional Owner and any Native Title Claimants), and in line with the established protocols of both organisations. Consideration will also be given to ensure these design of such projects elements meet Aboriginal stakeholder expectations and aspirations.
- d. To avoid doubt, NBG confirms that none of the Project deliverables detailed in Schedule 3 or anywhere else in this Agreement are legal requirements of any former or current environmental approvals, compliance or licence conditions of NBG.





Supporting the Hotham-Williams Community into the Future

Peel-Harvey Catchment Council has been busy working on its Regional Land Partnerships Tender bid to continue delivery of NRM services and projects with all sectors of the community, government and industry under the Regional Land Partnerships program (through the Australia Government). This funding, if successful, will ensure the PHCC can continue to work with the Hotham-Williams community into the future. The PHCC have submitted a number of intended projects, that were developed based on the Federal Governmental priorities and based on community feedback and the NRM needs of the broader catchment. If successful, these projects will enable continued community support to protect and restore our natural environment and our agricultural landscapes. We thank everyone who provided letters of support for our submission.



Partnering with the Hotham-Williams Community

PHCC are pleased to advise the community that a Memorandum of Understanding was signed in February by PHCC and the Shires of Boddington, Cuballing, Wandering and Williams to formalise their partnership to provide natural resource management (NRM) support to the landowners and community of the Hotham-Williams subcatchment, as defined within with Hotham-Williams NRM Plan 2015-2025.

The PHCC, through funding from the Australian Government have been providing on-ground support to landowners across the Hotham-Williams subcatchment for a number of years. This support has been able to be increased In the last four years thanks to funding received from the Australian Government via the "Rivers to Ramsar" project and more recently through the National Landcare Programme. Via the PHCC approx. \$700,000 has been invested in the Hotham-Williams since 2013 for onground NRM projects and it also enabled the development of the Hotham-Williams NRM Plan, with the community, to provide a framework to implement community priorities.

*Note the footprint of the works/support will extend to support those portions of the Shire of Pingelly, Collie, Narrogin and Wickepin, within the surface water catchment of the Peel-Harvey



Farmers for Fauna

The farmers surrounding Dryandra Woodland came together at the Dryandra Hall on 26th March to hear a project update on the Farmers for Fauna project.

The project aims to maintain and build a sustainable woylie and numbat populations in the iconic woodland by providing landholders assistance with feral animal control. Farmers were provided the opportunity to loan free cage traps and Mike Clark from the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) spoke on 1080 accreditation and baiting and offered the training and assessment on the day.

Narrow leaf cotton bush (Gomphocarpus fruticosus) is a declared pest in Western Australia (WA).

Cotton bush Invades pastures and can form dense thickets many hectares in size. It is toxic to livestock.

Its current legal status is Declared Pest - s22(2) Category C3 which requires action to be taken. 

Environment Grants deliver success stories

We have been busy visiting all the landholders who were successful with the latest PHCC Community Environmental Grant (Round 3) and viewing the work they have achieved. Through the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, PHCC has provided a total of just over \$28,000 towards these projects and landholders have invested a total of \$53,000 of their own in-kind investment or funds. This is what they have achieved together:

- Area Protected (Waterways) 529 ha
- Weed Control 94 ha
- Feral Animal Control 400 ha

Hotham-Williams Projects Launch



A successful event to launch the Newmont-PHCC Community Investment Agreement (CIA) "Hotham-Williams Rivers & Tributaries' Natural Resource Management and Conservation Project" and The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between PHCC and the Shires of Boddington, Cuballing, Wandering and Williams was held on the 16th of August.







Tunbridge Gully Planting Underway





Rabbit Virus Released



Thank you to all the landholders and Shire staff who have assisted us with the release of the RHDV-KI virus to control feral rabbits. Over two weeks in November, the virus was released at 31 sites across the sub-catchment. The project involved prefeeding of virus free pellets for 3 days prior to the virus release. Landholders have been recording rabbit numbers during this time as well as after the release (to determine effectiveness) which will be included in a centralised national database. Areas in the Eastern States are showing great results since the 2017 release.

Appendix 2: Hotham-Williams Newsletter Articles



A monthly update on Natural Resource Management (NRM) in the Hotham-Williams subcatchment. NRM refers to the management of natural resources such as land, water, soils, plants and animals. It brings together landuse planning, water management, biodiversity conservation and the future sustainability of industries such as agriculture, mining, tourism, fisheries and forestry.

Community funded to restore Tunbridge Gully

South 32 have committed nearly \$80,000 towards a community driven project to improve the health of Tunbridge Gully and the Hotham River in Boddington. Funding will enable the removal of invasive weeds, which threaten the biodiversity and ecology of Tunbridge Gully and the Hotham River, with an aim to return the mussels to Tunbridge Gully.

The joint project between South 32, the Peel-Harvey Catchment Council, Friends of the Reserves Boddington (Inc.) and Shire of Boddington, will restore water quality and a thriving ecosystem in Tunbridge Gully, which is infested with the aggressive weed species Juncus acutus. Nearly 80 per cent of the project area is overrun with the weeds and the impact is growing as they move downstream into the Hotham River and its associated pools and wetlands. Left unmanaged they will continue their journey

downstream along the Murray River and Into the Peel-Yalgorup Ramsar Listed Wetlands. Their density can make areas impenetrable, reducing recreational use and replacing native vegetation, which in turn removes food, shelter and shade for native species.

This is an important site for the community, including the local Noongar people as it was historically used as a source of food, including fresh water mussels and berries. The project will enable Boddington's community, land managers and the Noongar community to work together under the guidance of the PHCC. Onground works will be complemented with education and training opportunities including field days and events with local schools and community.



Farmers 4 Fauna

A new partnership between Peel Harvey Catchment Council (PHCC), the Department of Parks and Wildlife and Project Numbat will focus on the recovery of numbat (Myrmecobius fosciatus) and woylie (Bettongia pentciliata ogilbyi) populations within the Dryandra Woodland. The focus of the Farmers for Fauna project will be on one of the biggest threats, feral cats.

On 6th April the Threatened Species Commissioner, Gregory Andrews along with approximately 40 of Dryandra's neighbours, Shire representatives and guest speakers from the Department of Agriculture and Food Joined PHCC at Dryandra Woodland's Barna Mia Wildlife Sanctuary to launch the project. The Farmers for Fauna project is part of PHCC's commitment to support the community on key blosecurity issues across the Hotham-Williams. One interesting fact we learnt from Mr Andrews is that the numbat is twice as rare and more endangered than China's Giant Panda!




Tunbridge Gully Weed Spraying

The first round of spraying invasive weed Juncus acutus along Tunbridge Gully and the Hotham River foreshore in Boddington is complete. Partnership at Popanyinning



Feral cats in Australia have been identified as the main predator for small native mammal species and birds. PHCC, have partnered with the Shire of Cuballing and WA Feral Animal Management (WAFAM) to control feral cats at the Popanyinning Waste Disposal Site.

Funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Programme will assist with fencing around the site, monitoring feral cat numbers as well as strategic trapping. WAFAM will also work with the Shire on feral cat management procedures and protocols and with the community on responsible cat ownership to minimise impact on the surrounding biodiversity. Popanyinning is only a few kilometres away from the Dryandra Woodland, home to the endangered numbat and woylle among other iconic native fauna.

An information session on the Popanyinning project will be held on Saturday 6th May from 3pm to 4:30 pm at the Popanyinning Town Hall.







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Community comes together for planting morning

Recently 70 volunteers, including staff, students and parents from Boddington District High School, South32 Worsley Alumina, Newmont Boddington Gold, Friends of the Reserves – Boddington (Inc.) and the Shire of Boddington Joined Mel and Kate from PHCC in a tree planting event in Blue Gum Park (Boddington). Tunbridge Gully flows through Blue Gum park and is very degraded and infested with the invasive weed Juncus acutus (Spiny Rush) in this area. The morning event saw 400 local native seedlings planted along the creekline to assist with soil stabilisation and weed control. It was a great morning which finished off with a sausage sizzle catered by the Boddington Lions Club. This project is part of the larger Tunbridge Gully Restoration project which is supported by PHCC through funding from South32 Worsley Alumina and the Australian Government's National Landcare Programme.

A PHCC Community Environment Grant has enabled Trish and Robert Bowden of "Warren Hill" to fence off part of their farm's creek system to restrict stock access and protect the creek area.

Planning is also underway for the eradication of the invasive weed Juncus acutus from the creekline, revegetation with plants endemic to the area and control of pest animals on the 25ha property.

Having owned "Warren Hill" for twelve months, the Bowdens say "Long term our aim is to do more fencing in order to build up native bird and animal friendly laneways leading to established vegetation."



Great Outcomes from Community Environment Grants

A PHCC Community Environment Grant has enabled Jamie Fowler of Congelin district in the Shire of Williams to protect 88.6Ha of remnant woodland that is a Threatened Ecological Community (TEC) - Eucalypt Woodlands of the Western Wheatbelt.

Stock, which have been degrading the woodlands by feeding on regrowth, damaging tree bark and causing soil erosion, will now be excluded by the erection of approximately 13 km of fencing.

While stock and vehicle exclusion will encourage natural regeneration of native species, infill planting with nearly 2000 endemic seedlings will also be carried out. Weed control to minimise competition and feral animal control will continue to be undertaken.

Bridal Creeper Eradication

Friends of the Reserves – Boddington (Inc.) have engaged a contractor to commence bridal creeper eradication for Phase 2 of their State NRM Grant.

This is the second year of spraying in Camballing Reserve. The funds received will also assist with targeting other areas in the Shire of Boddington affected by Bridal Creeper. The weed is classed as a Weed of National Significance and has detrimental effects on native vegetation and waterways if not controlled.

PHCC is proud to support this project which tackles an invasive Weed of National Significance.



Environment Grants deliver success stories

We have been busy visiting all the landholders who were successful with the latest PHCC Community Environmental Grant (Round 3) and viewing the work they have achieved. Through the Australian Government's National Landcare Program, PHCC has provided a total of just over \$28,000 towards these projects and landholders have invested a total of \$53,000 of their own in-kind investment or funds. This is what they have achieved together:

- Area Protected (Waterways) 529 ha
- Weed Control 94 ha
- Feral Animal Control 400 ha
- Seedlings Planted 4,750
- Fencing Erected 8.6 km



Tunbridge Gully Planting Underway





Rabbit Virus Released



Thank you to all the landholders and Shire staff who have assisted us with the release of the RHDV-KI virus to control feral rabbits. Over two weeks in November, the virus was released at 31 sites across the sub-catchment. The project involved prefeeding of virus free pellets for 3 days prior to the virus release. Landholders have been recording rabbit numbers during this time as well as after the release (to determine effectiveness) which will be included in a centralised national database. Areas in the Eastern States are showing great results since the 2017 release.



Boddington Noongar Elder Greg Thorne recently spoke on country with PHCC's Mel Durack and Greg Marston from Friends of the Reserves -Boddington (Inc.) about the local Aboriginal history of the Camballing Reserve and Tunbridge Gully project sites. State Natural Resource Management Program WA #RoyaltiesforRegions South32 Worsley Alumina



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"South32 is proud to be part of this initiative that will contribute to restoring Tunbridge Gully and the Hotham River's health and vitality," Alysia said.

Alysia said it was exciting to be part of a project that was restoring an important heritage area for local Noongar people.

Local Noongar Elder Greg Thorne explained to project partners the cultural, environmental and social meaning of the Gully and its historic use as a source of food by the local Noongar community, including fresh water mussels and berries.

"Greg brought in a mussel and shared the story of local community members eating the freshwater mussels as they travelled toward the Hotham River. This local story symbolises the importance of protecting freshwater ecosystems for the health and well-being of communities, fish and wildlife, both in the river itself and along its banks," Alysia said.

The Shire of Boddington has welcomed the collaborative project approach and is providing funding and inkind support. The project will enable Boddington's community, land managers and the Noongar community to work together under the guidance of the PHCC to undertake weed surveying and mapping, before removing invasive weeds and replacing them with native seedlings.

"The Gully, which runs into the Hotham River and through the town of Boddington is an important part of the town's landscape and is highly valued by its community for the environmental, cultural, recreational and economic assets it supports," said CEO Chris Littlemore.

"This project will have significant outcomes for our community. In addition to the on-ground works the program will increase education and training opportunities to the broader community for long term site management. It will also enable us to deliver field days and events involving local schools and community, improve aesthetics and increase recreation opportunities for our community and visitors" he said.
