## Small Action Grants Deliver Success Stories

Environmental projects are being made possible throughout the region by the PHCC through the Small Action Grants program.

Two successful recipients taking action are the Boddington River Action Group Inc, and Friends of the Reserves Boddington (Inc.).

The Boddington River Action Group will rejuvenate the 2004 signage for the Boddington Fish Ladder in the Hotham River near the Community Centre. The signage is designed to educate the community and share the Group's knowledge of fish fauna present in the Hotham River, and the role of the rock ramp fishway in their migration up the river.

The Friends of the Reserves Boddington (Inc.) grant will see the publication of a brochure for the newly established walk trail through Red Hill Reserve, approximately 10 kilometres south west of Boddington. The brochure will outline the history of Red Hill Reserve and highlight fauna and flora in the area.

Projects including fencing, weed control, restoration and feral animal baiting activities will be carried out by landholders to protect over 1208 ha of the Woodlands.



The Great Cocky Count

On Sunday 9 April, Black-cockatoos across the State will be the focus through Birdlife Australia's Great Cocky Count, a long-term and significant citizen science survey for Western Australia.
